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

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION






Grade 9 Academic Mathematics



DCDSB Moves

Teaching and Learning staff launched to Daly Hypic Ark & 200 the DCDSB Moves campaign, placing a renewed focus on Daily Physical Activity (DPA) and its importance to student well-being and achievement. The campaign builds on DCDSB's Mental Health and Well-Being Strategy and supports the Ministry of Education's mandate to ensure students in elementary schools across the province receive a minimum of 20 minutes of quality physical activity daily.

Functional Fitness activities have been integrated into the instructional day, as well as professional

learning sessions for educators and staff meetings as research indicates the need to increase activity for learners of all ages. A series of tools was developed to support educators in implementing a DPA strategy for individual classrooms, ensuring inclusion for all.







Promoting Franco-Ontarian Language and Culture

Durham Catholic schools took part in Franco-Ontarian Day celebrations, marking the anniversary of the first raising of the Franco-Ontarian flag in Sudbury in 1975, and highlighting the long lasting impact of the French presence in Ontario. DCDSB is pleased to support the Franco-Ontarian community, learn more about their culture, and promote the French language in Core French, Extended French and French Immersion programs.

Orange Shirt Day



All Durham Catholic schools were called to participate in Orange Shirt Day, a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission residential school commemoration event held in Williams Lake, BC, Canada, in the spring of 2013. It is also an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come.

The day was established in 2013 through the efforts of Phyllis Webstad, Stswecem'c Xgat'tem, a First Nation woman who had her new orange shirt taken from her on her first day of residential school in 1973.

What Does Reconciliation Look Like?



Dr. Niigaan Sinclair, Associate Professor from the University of Manitoba, shared his views with DCDSB leaders, staff, students and families who participated in sessions during Indigenous Education Awareness Month. In his impactful presentation, "What Does Reconciliation Look Like?", Dr. Sinclair's insight built on our knowledge of Truth and Reconciliation and the indigenous ways of knowing.

Indigenous Advisory Circle



DCDSB's Indigenous Advisory Circle was established with a commitment to ensuring quality educational programs that promote student success for all. The group consists of indigenous and non-indigenous community members and


DCDSB staff. The circle meets throughout the year to plan the direction of Indigenous Education for Durham Catholic schools.

Self-Identification

First Nations, Metis and Inuit students are encouraged to voluntarily self-identify their indigenous ancestry.

Renewed Math Strategy: 2017–2018

In 2017-2018, DCDSB entered the second year of its Renewed Math Strategy. The primary and overall goal of the plan is to improve student achievement, well-being and engagement in Mathematics. The Numeracy Action Plan for 2017–2018 included actions and initiatives designed to support:

system improvement in service of school improvement;

- leadership for learning;
- secondary student achievement, well-being and engagement;
- elementary student achievement, well-being and engagement;
- students with learning disabilities;
- parent engagement in Mathematics education; and
- student voice.

Engaging Families in Mathematics

Parents and guardians were invited to learn about and love Math at the Math Café hosted by the Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (DCPIC). Led by DCDSB Mathematics Consultants, the handson workshop was an opportunity for parents and guardians to learn some tried and tested strategies to help support their children's Mathematical progress at home. Participants engaged in fun Math activities during the session as they gained confidence in their ability to help their children.

Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math (STEAM) Future Cities Challenge





40 parents and guardians attended the Math Café in 2017.

Grade 7 and 8 students across the board participated in the Future Cities Challenge, a STEAM-focused activity sponsored by Engineers Canada. Students shared their visions for sustainable cities and what those developments would look like 100 years from now. Students from the following schools were recognized as winners in the challenge:

- 1st Place: St. John Bosco CS for Boscovia
- 2nd Place: St. Bridget CS for New Pro City
- 3rd Place: St. John Paul II CS for Montreal



Talent Search: Regional Arts & Media Program



In 2017, DCDSB opened up the first-ever application and audition process for the Regional Arts and Media Program at All Saints Catholic Secondary School. To prepare students for the process, staff offered C-AMP workshops – clinics which offered coaching on what to expect when auditioning for the program. Students could apply to up to two streams, including Dance, Dramatic Arts, Instrumental Music, Media Arts, Visual Arts and Vocal Music.

400+ people attended Parent Information Night

in October 2017.

548 students in Grades 6, 7 and 8 participated in C-AMP workshops. 302 students in Grades 7, 8 and 9 enrolled in the program for its opening year.

Hands-on Learning at Habitat for Humanity's CentreTowne Site



"It's a rewarding experience. I've done stuff around the house and have helped neighbours a little, but nothing like this — I would definitely do it again." – Brandon VanWinden, Student Students from Father Leo J. Austin Catholic Secondary and All Saints Catholic Secondary School were involved in landscaping the yard and building a deck at Habitat for Humanity's Oshawa CentreTowne building site. This hands-on learning experience was a chance for students to give back to the local community, while gaining valuable experience.

In class, students learned about building permits, pouring a foundation and the build. Their learning was then translated to finishing the process.

Grade 9 Transition to High School Survey

A comprehensive Transition to High School survey that was conducted with all DCDSB Grade 9 students in December 2017 indicated a positive experience when transitioning from elementary to secondary school. Some of the data drawn from the survey indicated that:

- 76% felt that overall, their transition to high school was positive;
- 84% said that by the end of September, they knew their way around the school building;
- 92% said they met new people who they consider to be friends;
- 66% said school work is harder in high school;
- 76% said there is a lot more work in high school;

- 67% felt a lot more stress about school work than they did in Grade 8;
- 73% said they felt like they belonged;
- 55% participated in the Head Start program;
- 55% participated in the Grade 9 Orientation Day Barbecue.

Qualitative data was also collected. This information is being used by staff to assist in the transition of Grade 8 students to secondary school. A key recommendation was brought forward to pilot a Grade 9 only first day of school to start the 2018 school year to allow more opportunities for orientation of the school, meet and greet with staff, and a look at opportunities to join clubs, teams and other events.


Graduation Rates

DCDSB's four-year graduation rate was 88.8% and 92% in the five-year graduation rate as of August 31, 2017.

In order to earn an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, students must:

 earn a minimum of 30 credits, including 18 compulsory credits and 12 optional credits;

- meet the provincial secondary school literacy requirement; and
- complete 40 hours of community involvement activities.

Elephant in the Room

In January 2018, the Staff Wellness Committee rolled out the Elephant in the Room campaign through the Mood Disorders Society of Canada. In alignment with the Together for Mental Health Strategy, the goals of the campaign are to:

- remove the stigma that surrounds mental health and mental illness;
- open the conversation on mental health and mental illness; and
- create a stigma-free zone to have conversations without fear of discrimination or stigma.

All schools received a small blue elephant to place in the main office to signal that this is a stigma-free

Family Services Employee Assistance Program

To promote mental health and well-being, DCDSB extended a four-part workshop series in collaboration with the board's Family Services Employee Assistance Program (FSEAP). Workshops covered:

- Balancing Personal and Work Life
- Personal Strategies for Self-Care
- Dealing with Difficult People
- Mental Health in the Workplace

FSEAP is an ongoing service offering DCDSB employees and eligible family members access to free, professional and confidential counselling, coaching and consulting services. These services are intended to help staff manage personal, family or work-related concerns and become more resilient, enhancing their overall mental health and well-being.

- Partnering with the community.





Together for All





Academic Partnership

DCDSB and King's University College formed an academic partnership for international students who are interested in continuing their studies in Canada after graduating from a Durham Catholic high school. The formal Memorandum of Understanding offers international students pre-admission to King's College, a Catholic extension of Western University Canada. Final acceptance is based on student grades and other admission criteria. The agreement also intends to promote co-operation in international student recruitment, academic training, and collaborative research. New community partnership supports entrepreneurs and innovators in Durham Region



DCDSB in partnership with Community Innovation Lab (i-Lab), a registered non-profit founded in 2012 to address the social and economic gaps in communities through innovation and entrepreneurship, celebrated the grand opening of the facility's renovation project. Located in an underutilized wing at Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School, the space was renovated to break new ground in entrepreneurship and innovation with the opening of the Co-iLab hub.

Powered by a 6,000 square-foot space, the Co-iLab hub is designed to inspire and enable a vibrant entrepreneurial community in Durham Region through collaboration, ideation, acceleration and networks. This space was made possible through a three-year, \$747,500 Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) Grow grant, and an innovative partnership with DCDSB.

EMERGING TECHNOLOGY

Empowering Today for a Changing Tomorrow



100% of Durham Catholic secondary schools have collaborative 21st century learning commons

DCDSB has successfully transformed the traditional school library of all secondary schools to learning commons where students can use the space and technology for collaboration and research. In 2018, the transformation was completed at Archbishop Denis O'Connor Catholic High School and Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School. The space is fully equipped with state-of-the-art technology, along with collaborative learning areas for discussion and inquiry. The board invested \$200,000 in technology for these spaces.



Regional Arts & Media Program

With the opening of DCDSB's new Regional Arts & Media Program at All Saints Catholic Secondary School, a transformation was needed. High-end technology was incorporated to meet the needs of the media arts stream of the program. The board invested \$250,000 in technology which is used by students gaining specialized learning and experience in media production, graphic design, photography and other aspects of the arts and media culture.

iTeam-HD

Information Technology Enterprise Asset Management & HelpDesk

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The Information and Communications Technology (ICT) Department has adopted the Information Technology Enterprise Asset Management and HelpDesk (iTeam-HD) application which helps streamline processes, and allows the prioritization of tickets, improving ICT service levels.

- In 2017–2018, ICT staff closed over 13,000 HelpDesk tickets through iTeam-HD.
- 99% of the board's technology assets are now registered in the new Asset Management database.



Technology Modernization Enabling 21st Century Learning

DCDSB has implemented Phase 1 of 3 for a new comprehensive Learning Management System (LMS) to engage teachers, students and parents. Phase 1

involved the integration with a Student Information System and Azure Active Directory Single sign-on. It also involved the implementation of a pilot with some elementary and secondary teachers. The system offers a number of services, including:

- Classroom Management
- Assessment and reporting
- Group collaboration
- Parent engagement
- Notification

SchoolMessenger



SchoolMessenger was successfully launched across DCDSB as a homeschool communication tool (phone, e-mail and app notifications). The

system helps administrators and staff provide immediate and thorough engagement with their school communities. The system also serves as a secure student absence reporting tool for parents. All schools have successfully moved to the new system.

Before the Arts & Media program could be operational, and before the application process and auditions could open up, a lot of preliminary planning was involved in many areas. One of those areas included branding the program strategically as a board-wide initiative while maintaining the integrity of the regular track program at All Saints Catholic Secondary School.

Communications staff supported the implementation team with a strategic communications plan that involved everything from branding the program, signage, recruitment, podcast production, social media, media relations and more.

Financial Overview


During the spring of 2017, the board engaged in a public consultation process in conjunction with the development of the 2017–2018 budget to affirm priorities and ensure alignment with the Discovery 2020 Strategic Plan. The budget for 2017–2018 provided for expanded programs and services while maintaining a balanced budget during times of fiscal constraint. Such financial stability will provide the board with the opportunity and capacity to advance the strategic directions outlined in the strategic plan, ensuring that students and staff will be provided with the resources and supports necessary to foster positive student well-being and achievement now and into the future.

The 2017–2018 budget included \$247.5 million of operating expenditure and \$34.7 million of capital expenditure for a total budget of \$282.2 million. The budget is balanced and is compliant with the financial requirements of the Education Act. The chart below provides a breakdown of expenditure by category for the 2017–2018 school year.

Actual results for the 2017–2018 fiscal year also met the Ministry of Education's reporting requirements. In addition, the Board's external auditor provided an unqualified report regarding the 2017–2018 audited financial statements. The 2017–2018 financial statements also resulted in a balanced budget position which enabled the Board to maintain an appropriate level of operating reserves to meet the Ministry's expectations and to address unforeseen events beyond the board's control.

New Catholic Continuing Education Centre – Oshawa Campus



The new Anthony Meagher Catholic Continuing Education Centre - Oshawa opened in September 2017 at its new location at 850 King Street West with an official blessing by Our Most Reverend Bishop Vincent Nguyen in the spring of 2018.

The facility was built for students of all ages and includes computer labs, collaborative learning spaces, and a child minding room. The space is also intended to specialize in adult education programs that support 21st century learning and workplace training programs.

The new location offers meeting rooms for community partners and agencies, and provides support for students who need assistance. In addition, there is a special room for the Raising Healthy Children Program where students may bring their pre-school child or children to class and at the same time earn a high school credit. A free Early Years program is also offered in partnership with the YWCA.



Father Joseph Venini Catholic School Replacement Facility and Boundary Review

The Board of Trustees approved a boundary change to direct all students at Father Joseph Venini Catholic School to attend the new Unnamed North Oshawa Catholic School from Kindergarten through Grade 8 when the school opens its doors to students. This involved a consultation process with parents, guardians and members of the community which allowed for public input through a variety of means. In October 2018, construction for the new school facility began.



Capital Projects

- Opened the new Oshawa location for Anthony Meagher Catholic Continuing Education Centre.
- Opened the new hub space for the Community Innovation Lab at Monsignor Paul Dwyer Catholic High School.
- Opened the YMCA child care at St. Leo Catholic School.
- Opened the Early ON Child and Family Centre at Sir Albert Love Catholic School.
- Opened the Early ON Child and Family Centre at St. John Paul II Catholic School.
- Opened the PRYDE Learning Centre child care expansion at St. Joseph Catholic School (Uxbridge).
- Opened the YMCA child care expansion at St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic School.

- Purchased the Unnamed Audley Road Catholic Elementary School site in Ajax.
- Opened new locations for the board's Alternative Education programs.

As a Syrian Refugee, Hatem Shabaan came to Canada in September 2016 and his family followed in March 2017. Well-educated in their home country, Hatem and his parents, Husam and Hanan started their education in Canada by enrolling in the English as a Second Language (ESL) program at Archbishop Anthony Meagher Catholic Continuing Education Centre. Hatem spoke very little English and very quickly excelled in ESL before registering in adult day school at the Ajax Campus in September 2017. Upon registration, Hatem was given a PLAR Assessment (Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition) to earn equivalency credits and he developed a pathways plan in collaboration with our guidance counsellor. During this time, Hatem's mother Hanan registered in the evening Personal Support Worker (PSW) program.

A year later in June 2018, Hatem graduated with his Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) and became Archbishop Anthony Meagher Catholic Continuing Education Centre's Valedictorian for the Ajax Campus. Hatem won a Commitment Award for his dedication and success in academics. Hatem's mother, Hanan also graduated with honours from the PSW program, winning the Achievement Award for academics. Both Hatem and Hanan attended the graduation ceremony together.

"Archbishop Anthony Meagher CCEC is an amazing school, with amazing teachers. We would not be as successful in Canada without support from your school. I now have a job as a Patient Support Representative because of your school's support and references. We will never forget all of the help you have given to us. We were refugees for six years and lost everything. We are now safe and in peace. I am so proud of my family and thankful to the staff at Archbishop Anthony Meagher for supporting my



family. My sons Karim and Hatem have won awards in school, and I am so happy to have my job at the hospital. I now want to go to college to become a practical nurse," said Hanan.

Hatem noted, "My experience at Archbishop Anthony Meagher CCEC was extremely amazing. I got help from staff and students and I made good friends. My teachers helped to prepare me for Durham College and the Electrical Engineering Technician Program where I am now achieving 80s and 90s in all of my classes. Archbishop Anthony Meagher staff also helped me with my life in Canada because I feel a part of my community. I can communicate with everyone and I feel great about my future. I am very optimistic. I love this country. Canadians are so kind and I am very grateful to be here. This is my home and this is my future!"
