<u>Item g.1</u> VOICE SEAC Conference

V. Adamo

Valerie Adamo, SEAC representative for VOICE for the Hearing Impaired, shared information from a SEAC Conference attended by 40 VOICE SEAC representatives from across the province.

Presentation topics included IPRC process and data, sharing of resources about navigating the medical and educational systems, the importance of advocacy, and the sharing of best practices.

Valerie shared various resources from the conference and spoke about the important role of parents in supporting each other and creating strong relationships within the school community.

The roundtable discussions covered a variety of topics which could useful to all SEAC committees – particularly the marketing of SEAC and the role of members in promoting Special Education as a powerful resource.

Item I.1 Coordinator's Report – C. Plommer

Mental Health update:

DCDSB has partnered with **Mindfulness Everyday** to bring the **smartEducation**™ course to Durham. SMART (Stress Management and

Resiliency Techniques) is a 9 week, evidence-based program designed for staff who work with students in an educational setting. It has a strong emphasis on the cultivation of mindful awareness including elements of self-compassion, emotional literacy, self-regulation skills, optimism and self-care. 33 staff members have signed up and paid out-of-pocket. They'll receive a certificate of completion from UBC Faculty of Education.

At the recent parent Mental Health conference, 26 parents indicated an interest in the safeTALK course. Diane will be in touch with them this week to obtain a commitment. This session will be held on March 22, 2016.

Coordinator Update

The Assistive Technology Team and the Program Support teachers at Monsignor Paul Dwyer are in the final stages of planning a pilot Assistive Technology Transition Trip for students in the Monsignor Paul Dwyer Family of Schools. Taking placing during three Wednesdays in April, students in Grade 8 who use Assistive Technology will spend the day partnering with secondary students who use A.T. With the support of the Program Support Teachers at Dwyer, students will experience high school life through the lens of Assistive Technology.

In February, the Assistive Technology team met for a Research and Development Day to explore new technologies, as well as continue to troubleshoot how to best support our students with technology.

On Monday, February 22nd, Student Services hosted the Curriculum Chairs Capacity Day. Shawna MacKellar, Psychometrist with DCDSB, presented on Differentiated Practice through the lens of students with Learning Disabilities. Curriculum Chairs were challenged to share the information learned with their colleagues in their departments.

Last November, during Bullying Prevention and Intervention Week, the Safe Schools department held a Board-wide competition to create a design or slogan for a T-shirt to be used for this year's Pink Shirt Day. Rachel Castillo, a Grade 8 Student from St. Patrick Catholic School won the contest with her design and slogan "Kindness is my Superpower." The t-shirt was worn across DCDSB on Wednesday, February 24^{th,} as all staff and students supported National Pink Shirt Day.

On Monday, February 29th, a speaker from the Ontario Federation of Indigenous Friendship Centres presented to Student Services on the topic of Cultural Competency. The day was devoted to developing awareness about First Nations, Métis, and Inuit history, cultures and traditions. The day was enlightening and educational.

Student Services is proud to present another event in the Parents as Partners series "Learning with a Difference Conference" on May 25th. This conference is for parents, students, and staff as we celebrate and support our students with Learning Disabilities. The keynote speaker will be Leslie Andrews. Breakout sessions will include Assistive Technology, Pathways – transitioning from elementary to secondary and post-secondary, Learning Strategies, Resiliency and Advocacy, as well as different types of Learning Disabilities and Numeracy. We are still looking for agencies to create store-front displays and would welcome any donations for giveaways, refreshments and swag-bags.

Item I.2 Superintendent's Report- J. Bowyer

Congratulations to Diane Mullane and SEAC on their parent evening last week. They had approximately 300 people in attendance and significant positive feedback about the keynote and various speakers. A special thank you to Diane's committee, especially Valerie Adamo who acted as the SEAC representative. Also thank you to Valerie's husband who donated many trays of fruit and vegetables to the event.

Congratulations also to Diane who is a guest columnist in the Metroland newspapers – writing on the topic of Raising Resilient Children.

We recently received an invitation from the Ontario Catholic School Trustees Association to participate in the Ontario Mental Health Promotion, Prevention and Early Intervention Survey. This is a survey is part of a multi-ministry sponsored provincial Mental Health and Addiction Strategy Initiative.

The Parents Reaching Out (PRO) Grant is available again this year and we are in the process of completing the application. There are a variety of topics for which we can apply for the grant. The broadest topic, Special Education, will provide for the greatest range of options.

DCDSB is once again partnering with the University of Ontario Institute of Technology to offer Special Education courses. Special Education Part 1 will be facilitated by Helen Killoran; Special Education Part 2 will be facilitated by Michelle Meraw, and Special Education Specialist will be facilitated by Melody Walters, Program Support Curriculum Chair at Monsignor John Pereyma C.S.S. <u>Ministry of Education Memorandum – March 1, 2016 – Provincial and Demonstration</u> Schools Consultation

Superintendent Bowyer provided information regarding the March 1 memo from Louise Sirisko, Director, Special Education Policy and Programs Branch: Provincial and Demonstration Schools Consultation:

- a. Consultation will begin in March and will include:
 - i. Centre Jules-Leger (Ottawa) Provincial and Demonstration School
 - ii. Robarts School for the Deaf (London)
 - iii. 3 Demonstration Schools Sagonaska Demonstration School in Belleville

This decision is a result of the Drummond Report in March 2015 that said the Ministry of Education needed to examine the feasibility of maintaing these schools. Consideration of a number of factors:

- Movement towards inclusion; closing provincial and demonstration schools recognizes that students are more alike than different.
- Low enrollment; there is little impact on each Board. Very few students from DCDSB attend- and only at the request of the parent. It is never based on a recommendation from us as we feel we are well placed to support all students.
- Demonstration schools are no longer as unique as they once were. The
 technology is in all schools now. Special programs are being used in schools
 across the province. For example, the Hospital for Sick Children Program –
 "Empower", a direct teaching reading program for students with a learning
 disability is used in many Boards. Mass marketed versions of this program,
 Levelled Literacy Intervention, are being used in most schools in our Board.
- · Little to no transference of professional learning back to the school system.
- · Changing face of Deaf Education. Very few families are opting for a signing program as technology is providing students with access. There is a greater focus on oral programs, especially with the increase in cochlear implants.

Inquiries and Miscellaneous continued

DCDSB statistics:

Sagonaska – No students there this year; one student last year; Significant intake process, not all students are accepted. The process can be very disheartening.

Schools not being considered in the provincial consultation at this time:

EC Drury School for the Deaf in Milton – two students

Sir James Whitney School for the Deaf in Belleville – two students

W. Ross MacDonald School for the Blind in Brantford – one student

The Superintendent indicated that a copy of the memorandum will be shared with all SEAC members. A discussion took place between SEAC members during which Chair Smart suggested that the committee wait for the consultation process before considering contacting the Ministry of Education.

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



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Partnering with Schools for Student Success: Effective Parent Advocacy

The Learning Disabilities Association of Ontario, in partnership with the Integra Program of the Child Development Institute, is presenting an **online workshop** for parents and those who are helping parents navigate the school system. The course is called *Partnering with Schools for Student Success*, and promotes a collaborative approach to advocacy, based on knowledge and understanding on both sides.

The **seven units** explore perspectives of parents and schools, promote an understanding of the needs of students and of special education and behaviour management processes in schools, and teach strategies for successful negotiation. Scenarios will be used to help illustrate the ideas presented.

The online course is offered in **two versions**:

- Professionals, and others who are working with parents, will do assignments at the end of each unit, and submit a final case study, in order to receive a *Certificate of Completion*.
- Parents can choose to take the course for their own information, without submitting assignments or receiving a Certificate of Completion, for a reduced fee.

All participants will have access to a discussion forum where they can ask questions and share ideas.

The course will be moderated by **Kate Cressman**, and **Diane Wagner**, Public Policy & Education Consultant at LDAO. **Kate** is the Community Education and Engagement facilitator with the Integra Program of the Child Development Institute. She provides training and promotes collaboration between schools, students, parents and other helping professionals around children's mental health and learning.

The seven units will be made available one week at a time over seven weeks, starting on **April** 4^{th} , **2016**.

Unit 1: Partnership and Advocacy: Perspectives of Parents and Schools

- Will look at the meaning of advocacy in the context of effective partnerships with the school
- Will examine their thoughts, feelings and beliefs regarding education and schools as these may influence their interaction with the school
- Will consider how to understand the perspective of the school

Unit 2: Strategies and Models for Partnership and Advocacy

Participants:

- Will become familiar with 4 models for planning advocacy efforts on behalf of a child
- Will recognize the role of careful documentation and record-keeping
- Will learn how to handle meetings and effectively use note-taking

Unit 3: Understanding How the Special Education System Works: The Education Act, IPRCs and IEPs

Participants:

- Will learn how current legislation in the Education Act provides for students with special education needs
- Will explore the legal context and processes of the IPRC and IEP
- Will understand how to collaborate in development of an IEP
- Will learn how to work on a 'living IEP' within the classroom environment

Unit 4: Understanding Psychological Assessment Reports

Participants:

- Will understand the purpose of psychological assessments and the factors to be considered when recommending psychological testing
- Will understand how core psychological concepts associated with learning disabilities and other disorders are assessed and interpreted
- Will become comfortable in reading psychology reports and asking questions about reports

Unit 5: Understanding How Children Communicate Difficulty at School: Behaviour Problems as Communication

Participants:

- · Will understand that behaviour can act as a form of communication from the child
- Will learn how to use a "team approach" to problem-solve and brainstorm possible reasons for inappropriate behaviour
- Will understand how to use Behaviour Plans to prevent behaviour difficulties from escalating into disciple problems

Unit 6: Students with Special Education Needs and School Discipline Policies: Progressive Discipline, Mitigating Factors, Suspension and Expulsion

Participants:

- Will understand what the school means by progressive discipline
- Will become familiar with rules and requirements around suspension
- Will learn about other ways students can be kept out of school, including Expulsion

Unit 7: Negotiation and Resolving Conflicts: Informal and Formal Processes

Participants:

- Will understand some of the reasons that disputes and conflicts arise
- Will learn methods which will allow them to collaborate with educators to prevent conflicts where
 possible and to resolve them quickly when they arise
- Will understand options for using formal dispute resolution processes
- Will gain an overview of effective ways to work through conflict by using negotiating skills.
